

'Trouble Making' Book Launched

Rabbi Elli Tikvah Sarah launched Trouble-Making Judaism her recently published book at the Brighton Quaker Meeting House



At its heart, Judaism is about – is supposed to be about – trouble-making.'

Elli Tikvah Sarah, the first ordained lesbian rabbi to lead a mainstream synagogue in Britain, has been making trouble for as long as she can remember. She reveals her struggles over many years to be accepted as a radical pioneer and the challenges that remain to make Judaism inclusive and responsive in a changing world.

Now the leader of a successful thriving Liberal synagogue and a noted innovator of new rituals and practices Rabbi Sarah shows how it is possible to revitalise communities by enabling and supporting those on the margins such as lesbian and gay people, converts, patrilineal Jews, and families not wanting to circumcise their sons. Taking her inspiration from trouble-making prophets, the early rabbis who re-invented Jewish life and from women pioneers whose voices are rarely heard she explains how Jewish teaching: can help individuals on their journeys, be a key to cross-cultural understanding and could be the basis for a just peace in the Israel Palestine conflict.

This year our guest speaker was from the Hindu tradition, Mr Jay Lakhani, an educationalist who is Director of the Hindu Academy and involved in the religious education curriculum through the RE Council of England and Wales. We were particularly pleased to welcome members of the local Gujarati Cultural Society to the IECG for this occasion.

there are many paths to truth

Mr Lakhani's theme was 'Ancient Wisdom for the Modern World'. He said that the Hindu tradition had taught him the value of pluralism, which acknowledges that there are many paths to truth. In a gripping and wide-ranging presentation, Mr Lakhani said that human beings, through the ages, had tried to 'picture' 'God' or the universal spirit in many different ways, using inadequate human expression, and that what had driven the great sages of the past to attempt to communicate these ideas, using language, the only tool they had at their disposal, was their deep love for humanity.

As a physicist by academic background, Mr Lakhani was fully aware of the often acrimonious 'religion versus science' debate. In his opinion, science, including quantum physics, did not, and never could, negate the idea of 'spirit', which is found 'bubbling up' through everything.

Charter for Compassion



"All faiths insist that compassion is the test of true spirituality and that it brings us into relation with the transcendence we call God, Brahman, Nirvana or Dao. Each has formulated its own version of what is sometimes called the Golden Rule: 'Do not treat others as you would not like them to treat you'...Further, they insist that you cannot confine your benevolence to your own group: you must have concern for everybody – enemies!...it is hard to think of a time when the compassionate voice of religion has been so sorely needed.

Our world is dangerously polarised..... if our religious and ethical traditions fail to address this challenge, they will fail the test of our time."

Imam Dr Abduljalil Sajid has sent us his annual report on his work during the past year.

The full report with the wide an very busy schedule of conferences and meetings that he has represented us at during 2011 is available to download from our website.

Already this year he has represented us at the Elijah Board of World Religious Leaders in Oxfordshire. The Elijah Interfaith Institute is a multinational, UNESCO-sponsored not-for-profit organization dedicated to fostering peace between the world's diverse faith communities through interfaith dialogue, education, research and dissemination. The Board is made up of leading figures from Judaism, Islam, Christianity, Buddhism and the Religions of India.

We have also received some news from Imam Dr Abduljalil Sajid of a forthcoming conference he will be attending in Ukraine He will be speaking at the Kiev Interfaith Forum in April this year. Leaders from the worlds of religion, politics and academia will gather in Kiev, Ukraine for a historic international conference entitled *Global Winds of Change: Religion's Role in Today's World; The Challenges in Democracies and Secular Society.* This event, which serves as a follow-up to last year's very successful conference as part of the Kyiv Interfaith Forum, will allow us to address the all important issues surrounding what place faith plays in modern society and how secularization will impact upon the global tomorrow.

Charitable Giving

People who are religious donate over twice as much money to charity as those without a faith, according to figures from the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF)'s 2011 Market Tracker Report.

These results not only show that those of faith are more generous to charity in general, but that their giving is not uniquely focused on their own religious activities. If anything, people of faith broadly give in line with the rest of the general public, to a variety of different appeals. The culture of giving within religious circles that is demonstrated by our survey is an admirable one, and a phenomenon that clearly enriches our society.
