



Nostalgia can be Dangerous, but Interfaith Reminds Us...

J M W Turner's perception of Brighton 200 years ago was very unlike Brighton today. Now the term 'boat people' means something very different, almost derogatory – it refers to refugees fleeing by boat. Yet apparently the entire population of this country was created by refugees, starting with the nomad hunter-gatherers who settled in the British Isles 10,000 years ago. Accepting people of all races and faiths is about accepting ourselves and our antecedents, our history and our rich language and culture. If only more of our island's people could change their views about strangers, we would be so much stronger in so many ways. This is why the interfaith ethos is so important... it destroys the barriers of prejudice.

That said there are many concerns at the moment. Brutal and terrible wars in the Ukraine and Gaza continue, and the call for peace is increasingly loud. This month The IFCG is involved in initiatives for peace, environmental awareness, friendship and discovery.

Try out some of the events outlined here. Some like our Friendship Hours and Buddying Scheme are run by the IFCG, while the Ageing Well Festival is a Council run project.

from September 26<sup>th</sup> to October 10th: The Ageing Well Festival


